ICSI WEBINAR ON EYE DOMINANCE IN THE CONTEXT OF SHOTGUN

SHOOTING By Rob Clackson A.I.C.S.I. Summary of Zoom Seminar

To make a pointing judgement with a shotgun requires at least two reference points.

The forward reference point is provided by the bead or the rib in the vicinity of the muzzles. The rear reference point is provided by one of our eyes. This is effectively the rear sight.

The purpose of correct gun fit and consistent gun mount is to position the shooter's eye (rear reference point, or REFERENT EYE) in exactly the right place behind the shotgun action. This position must allow the aligned eye to have an unobstructed view of the target. The shooter is in effect attaching the rear sight to the action.

We have two eyes which may not work with equal efficiency. This can give rise to the preferential use of one eye compared with it's fellow to accomplish a specific task.

The consensus amongst vision scientists and researchers is that there are different types of eye dominance, and these different dominances can coexist in the same individual depending on the method of testing and the task.

MOTOR DOMINANCE is assessed by finger pointing or by sighting through an aperture which is moved back to the face.

ACUITY DOMINANCE refers to the predominant use of the eye with the sharper image.

SENSORY DOMINANCE is assessed by briefly flashing a different image independently to each eye in turn. The individual records which image they are conscious of seeing more often. This is part of a process known as retinal rivalry.

It follows from this that the use of the term eye dominance can be ambiguous and confusing.

From the moment the shooter first sees the target, the VISUAL PICKUP POINT, to the instant the shot is taken the instructor needs to know which eye is providing most visual input. This eye will be acting as the rear reference point / referent eye. This visual input combined with technique, muscle memory etc allows us to compute the appropriate gun movement to achieve a hit.

Possibly the best way of determining which eye is being used as the REFERENT EYE is an initial proven empty gun mounted to the instructor's eye. This also gives vital gun fit information and is closest to the actual optical task when shooting. Next watch the client shoot at various targets. The straight going away and straight driven targets are most informative. A consistent miss to the right or left associated with an off-eye reference point is usually identifiable.

For the Instructor to give accurate advice on eye problems more information is required. Ask a few questions. Do you wear spectacles or contact lenses for distance tasks such as driving or TV? Is there any history of eye problems as a child such as patching for a lazy eye or an operation to straighten the eyes? When did you last have a sight test? Following an optometric eye test a spectacle prescription will be issued. It should be possible (with an explanation of why this information is required) to ask for both unaided and corrected visual acuities of the right and left eyes and if stable binocular vision and stereopsis is present.

If this information is unavailable, consider doing a simple car number plate test. Cover each eye in turn and ask the shooter to read a number plate at 20m. This is the minimum legal driving requirement and is equivalent to 6/12 Snellen or 50% of normal good vision. If you can read the plate at 40m you have 6/6 Snellen which is 100% of normal good vision. Take note of any difference between the two eyes as this could give rise to ACUITY DOMINANCE in the off eye.

In conclusion, simply occluding one of the novice shooter's eyes without having much more detailed information could be the wrong advice.

Shotgun Certificate Delays

With the difficulties experienced by those wishing to renew their shotgun certificates the CPSA has issued the following advice. The full article may be viewed on their website.

Shotgun Licence Renewal issues - CPSA

As long as you have submitted a valid renewal application at least eight weeks before your certificate was due to expire, you will automatically be granted an 8-week extension of your current certificate. However, your application will only be classed as valid and complete if you have also paid the renewal fee and supplied the obligatory medical form signed and stamped by your GP at least eight weeks before your certificate expires. Members are therefore advised to contact your GP surgery at least three to four months before expiry of your certificate to ensure you get the signed medical form in good time to submit your renewal application early enough to benefit from the automatic extension.

Care of Chokes



Just recently the Kibworth Gun Shop has seen several shotguns presented to the staff where the chokes are really stuck firm in the barrels. Investigation often leads to owners admitting that they have not removed or cleaned their chokes in a long time or in some cases neglecting to clean their guns even after a damp day shooting. At Kibworth we have a tool for removing stubborn chokes. It resembles a raw bolt and basically expands to grip the choke and then

a spanner is used to wind the choke out. However, some chokes are so tightly stuck that any major twisting motion on this tool can result in the barrels twisting. At this point the customer has two options, take the gun away and soak the barrel end in diesel or penetrating fluid and see if that frees the chokes or send it direct to a gunsmith.

All this grief can be avoided by regular movement of the chokes between shoots and careful cleaning of the gun and chokes after shooting and the application of a suitable grease on the threads of the chokes when replacing them into the barrels.

Another problem we have seen recently if the rippling of barrels caused by chokes not being screwed in properly so that they form a gas seal between chokes and barrels. Chokes should not be over tightened but conversely, they should not be loose. A "snug" fit is all that is needed. The use of a Teague choke key often gives the correct degree of tightness to the choke in the barrel.


