The meeting proceeded in line with the set agenda with unanimous acceptance of the Chair's Report, Financial Statement and Budget and the Chair and Council were returned for another year.

We wish him well in the future but we know he is on hand to give advice particularly on the Game and Loaders Course which he developed with the help of Malcolm Plant and Derek Wetter.

As a trained engineer he looked for a solution and to this issue which kept his focus on the target not the gun. After research and trials he developed the product which we now know as the SP.

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After a splendid lunch provided by Karl and his team from Nottingham and District Gun Club, Steve continued revealing the research and trials which led to his product and the experiences of many top class shots who now use the product. With the use of wooden guns with SP's attached members were able to try out the system. Moving to a skeet range members were able to try the products on their own guns (using the non permanent Coach's version).

For some members present with off eye as the referent eye, the transformation was clear. Personally I observed a shooter going from a gun deviation which would give a good 4 foot off target at 75 to bang under the referent eye and bang on target. For some the process of triggering the referent eye took a little time. Rob Clarkson , our eye dominance expert, questioned Steve from a professional and shooting perspective and agreed with the theory and application which he felt would work for many people with off eye problems.

We would like to thank Steve for his time and efforts to inform coaches of his product and allow them the opportunity to try and sample his product. We did not get the usual sales pitch associated with shooting products, Steve always says he is an engineer and shooter not a salesman.

It was apparent at the end of the session that he had converted a number of members as he had a steady stream of members buying his coaching pack.





PLYMOUTH SHOOTINGS IOPC REPORT

Below is an extract from the IOPC report and recommendations regarding the tragic shootings in Plymouth. The IOPC investigation commenced in tandem with the criminal investigation and the Coroner's Inquest. Their report has been published following the Inquest findings and recommendations.

Although a tragic incident the reports, Inquest and IOPC, both point to major failings in the work of the Devon and Cornwall Police. However, both go on to recommend that the present system be substantially beefed up to eliminate any possibility of a future problem. Again, the honest shooter must endure the rigours of inspection because of the failings of a team which the IOPC concluded did not do their job.

The full report is linked at the end of this summary.

The Independent Office for Police Conduct (IOPC) has issued a series of recommendations both to Devon and Cornwall Police, and nationally, to strengthen firearms licensing controls following our investigation into the Plymouth mass shooting.

Our recommendations nationally, issued to the Home Office, included the need for clear guidance on checks that should be conducted when assessing applications, removing any distinction between requirements for firearms and shotgun certificates, that referees must have recent knowledge of an applicant, and that interviews with family members or cohabitees should be carried out where a certificate holder is involved in a violent offence. We are continuing to consult the Home Office over implementation of the measures for the police service in England and Wales.

- Identified organisational learning recommendations under Paragraph 28A of Schedule 3 to the Police Reform Act 2002 We have sent the following provisional recommendations to the Home Office and are consulting with them regarding these matters.
- The IOPC recommends that the Home Office amends the Statutory Guidance for Chief Officers of Police on Firearms Licensing to set out clearly when further checks (beyond the minimum) are expected to take place when assessing an application for a firearm or shotgun certificate. This could include cases where there has been any prior police involvement due to alleged violent behaviour by the applicant, and cases where a relevant medical condition has been disclosed.

- ♦ The IOPC recommends that the Home Office adds Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) to the list of relevant medical conditions in the Statutory Guidance for Chief Officers of Police on Firearms Licensing. 37
- ♦ The IOPC recommends that legislation and national guidance are amended to remove any distinction between the processes and requirements in relation to shotgun and firearms certificate holders.
- ♦ The IOPC recommends that the Statutory Guidance for Chief Officers of Police on Firearms Licensing is amended to include further requirements for suitable referees. Specifically, it is recommended that the guidance is changed to require that referees must have recent knowledge of the applicant (e.g., within the last 12 months), and reasonably in-depth knowledge of the applicant's character, circumstances, temperament, and overall fitness to be entrusted with a firearm.
- ◆ The IOPC recommends that the Statutory Guidance on Firearms Licensing is amended to specify that, whenever a certificate holder is involved in a violent offence, other adults who live with the certificate holder should be questioned privately about their relationship with the certificate holder and any domestic issues or other concerns they may have, including any recent changes in the certificate holder's mental health or life circumstances.
- ♦ The IOPC recommends that the Statutory Guidance on Firearms Licensing is amended to require that open-source research is conducted for all applications, with more intrusive checks for high risk applicants.

AND FINALLY.....

From Ron Braithwaite...

Hi John,

Good to see you yesterday and thanks for a very good AGM & interesting presentation by Steve from SP. As promised I'm including the notifications from West Mercia Firearms I'd mentioned. There are two of them about security that were sent to shooting grounds and are as follows:

The first WM notification that came out:

"We have had yet another theft of a shotgun and associated equipment from a vehicle. Please can I ask that you spread the message to your customers that under no circumstances should guns be kept in their vehicles, no matter how long for, unless there is specific security within the vehicle, such as a gun box etc.

There is a definite trend at the moment regarding such thefts.

This is the second notification they sent only a week after the first one. It's as follows:

"We have had yet more burglaries across West Mercia culminating in guns being stolen. I circulated recently about security of guns in vehicles, but this particular trend is showing a real issue with certificate holders keeping their cabinet keys in a drawer or cupboard, and not securely in a digital key safe (which we are now recommending to all certificate holders). Not only does this make it easy for the burglars, but also for anyone else with access to the home who do not have appropriate certificates and therefore should not have access to guns.

These burglaries are not only arming criminals but there is an impact which is as yet unknown, in relation to victims, or future victims of crime.

Can I ask that you reinforce to your customers regarding key security, that ON-LY they as certificate holders should know where the keys are and how to access them, or keep them with themselves at all times. If they choose to keep their keys insecure, not only are they arming criminals, or potentially vulnerable members of their family, they are likely to lose their certificates when it is found that the keys are insecure. In addition, criminal charges may be brought.

I appreciate the advice you currently give to your certificate holders but if this could be reinforced as well, this would help all of us, in particular the certificate holders to retain their certificates, but also potential future victims."

I hope this is of interest to the Institute, I look forward to seeing you again at the next meeting or workshop.
