Coach and Instructor Development Day

SIMULATED GAME SHOOTING

Member Russ Dickinson recently organised a simulated game day for some of the clients he has been coaching at Thimbleby in North Yorkshire. An introduction to game shooting for some and an opportunity to practice for others, Russ organised the day to meet their needs and provide an opportunity to boost their confidence.

Russ writes:

Grimston Simulated Game Shoot 14.04.2023.

My background in the shooting sports is rooted in game shooting. A few years ago I was introduced to simulated game shooting at a farm belonging to some friends, since that time I have become much more involved in this branch of the sport, to the point where, that's my main interest lies.

A few of the people I have taught have heard me enthusing about sim shooting and have asked me how they enter the sport, many only ever having shot within a cage at a clay ground. This caused me to think about how I could approach this, to effectively teach them a different skill set.

I am fortunate in that both John Shields and Liam French who run Grimston Simulated Game shoot nr Tadcaster North Yorks, are good friends of mine. Initially I chatted about the feasibility of organising a day specifically for beginners, some of whom had less than a year shooting experience. What I needed was a lead into this type of shooting where the shooter isn't standing in a cage.

There are some clay grounds that have the facility to shoot multiple driven targets from one stand without a cage also some have grouse butts with a 6 trap game trailer throwing driven clays. I considered this a good starting point and encouraged interested parties to come practice on that type of layout.

A few weeks ago, I had a day out at Grimston with my two friends and looked at what would be considered a standard day. I have personally shot all of the drives the guns experienced on that particular day and having discussed the format of the day with John and Liam, we agreed that the level of difficulty would be too great for a beginner shooter.

What I wanted was to provide success for each of the shooters from the first drive, making each of the drives progressively more difficult by altering the angle and speed of the clays as the day unfolded.

We decided that the first drive would be very easy and to use that as a barometer to decide how to regulate the level of difficulty on the next drive. One option being to repeat the first drive from a different peg.

My objective was to get the participants to a level where they could shoot the grouse drive, building on what I had taught them previously.

I wanted to shoot on the day, so I asked a good friend of mine and institute member Chris Cottingham if he would be willing to come along and be on hand if any of the participants were experiencing problems.

The day was set for Friday 14th April. We met at the shoot hut on the estate and were greeted by bacon sandwiches and a cup of tea. John Shields conducted the shoot briefing. We had previously agreed that this would be in much more detail than usual, explaining the background to Simulated game shooting and how it replicated a day on driven pheasants and partridges. The safety aspect was covered within this briefing.

The first drive was a partridge drive. Liam had briefed the trappers to ease off the springs and set the clays a little higher than usual. They use steerable Promatic traps, the trappers each have a radio to enable them, on direction to vary the clays whilst the drive is in progress.

The first drive was a great success, the level of ability of all of the shooters being higher than we initially anticipated.

It was decided that the second drive would be pitched at a higher level than planned, and again the participants performed extremely well.

We returned to the shoot hut for elevenses and discussed with the guns how we thought we could develop the day. They chose to do a team flush competition. This is set up on a small area of the shoot and is a regular feature of Grimston sim days. A slab of cartridges is provided for the winning team. The results of this competition were not far off comparable to what we would expect of more experienced guns.

Such was the success of the day, at this stage it was decided to let them shoot the Grouse drive. John gave an additional safety briefing in relation to butt sticks and we ran the drive. Such was the success of this was that the trappers were able to wind up the spring tension of the traps and pitch the clays lower and faster than we had planned as the drive progressed. Even the trappers commented on how well the guns performed. I was pleased because it showed that the way I had approached the teaching of this type of target had worked.

The last drive was a high partridge drive. I have shot this particular drive in the recent past. The level of difficulty was no different to that seen on a regular sim day. Again the shooters performed to a very high standard.

The day was rounded off by a lovely meal back at the shoot hut.

In conclusion, every one of the guns said that they had enjoyed the day enormously and all said that they want to continue in that particular aspect of the sport. Both Liam and John congratulated the guns on their high level of achievement.

I wish to thank John and Liam for working with me to organise such a successful day. Chris Cottingham for his support throughout the day. Also to my wife Sue and Liz Fenn for the support they gave to the lady participants.


Founded in 1987, The Institute of Clay Shooting Instructors is a formal, non-profit making organisation serving Clay Shooting Coaches and Instructors.
