FIREARMS LICENSING STATEMENT MADE ON 29 JUNE 2023



THE RT HON CHRIS PHILP IS THE CONSERVATIVE MP FOR <u>CROYDON SOUTH</u>, AND HAS BEEN AN MP CONTINUOUSLY SINCE 7 MAY 2015. HE CURRENT-LY HOLDS THE GOVERNMENT POST OF MINISTER OF STATE (HOME OFFICE).

The Minister responsible for firearms licensing Chris Philip, has made a statement to the House of Commons and launched a public consultation on the future of firearms licensing in the UK. It was clear after the Coroners report and the Independent Office for Police Conduct (IOPC report following the Plymouth shootings that the Home Office would have to look at the licensing of firearms to try to put the publics mind at rest regarding firearms and public safety. Thankfully it appears that the Government are minded to be balanced and proportionate in their response as indicated below.

"As I have said, public safety is our priority. At the same time, the measures to manage the risk to public safety must be proportionate and balanced with the fact that the vast majority of licensed firearms holders are law abiding and cause no concern.

It is for this reason that the Government has decided not to proceed with recommendations on aligning shotgun and firearms legislation. Shotguns are already subject to significant controls, and they are important in helping farmers control vermin on their land, as well as being used in a variety of rural pursuits. We will keep this under review, but we are currently of the view that additional controls on shotguns are unnecessary and would have a negative impact on their legitimate use "

However the Minister has launched a public consultation regarding the future shape and scope of firearm licensing.

They are worth a read and members may wish to respond to the consultation in a private and individual manner.

COACHING DISABLED SHOOTERS

It is always refreshing when a member decides to send me a note about their coaching experiences. Sometimes it is to share a funny occurrence and sometimes to share a solution to a



coaching problem. On Tuesday last week I received a email from my great friend Russ Dickinson who had come across a situation which he felt he should share with me and after talking to him he agreed that I should share his experience with members through News Shots.

Russ's note is reproduced below

I have been up at Thimbleby today, Saturday 24th June.

At the start of each day I have a computer print showing customer and resource details. 1.5 hours, 3 men who haven't shot before.

I was fairly surprised but not phased to be greeted by 2 men in wheelchairs and one man who walked with a stick.

Years ago when I was a police instructor I did some voluntary work coaching disabled shooters to complete using air rifles.

Useful experience, teaching me to enable shooters by looking at each person, evaluating their disability and working with them to allow them to achieve their individual potential.

The 2 shooters in wheelchairs were affected by upper spinal injury and had no muscular control below nipple level. The other shooter was a leg amputee.

Initially I talked about balance, stance, posture etc for an able bodied person and how we would adapt this for shooting seated or in the case of the amputee how this would affect stability.

At the end of the session I found that the spinal injury shooters had more success shooting targets in the vertical plane and that the limited range of horizontal movement made shooting crossing targets challenging.

The amputee shooter was right handed and had lost his right leg. The issue here was again one of balance and stability.

Across all three shooters fatigue was an issue, so this limited each of them to a maximum of

about 5 cartridges before changing over.

My aim at the start of the session was to enable them to enjoy the sport of clay pigeon shooting. I think I achieved this. They all achieved a result within their ability.

I have spoken about the subject of shooting with disabilities with John Peacock at length in the past and feel that the guidance he gave me coupled with my previous experience was valuable.

If any other institute member has any further advice I would welcome any help or advice.

I am reasonably confident this group will return.

Clearly Russ had a positive experience with this group and I am sure there are many members who have experience working with disabled shooters and perhaps they could share their experience with Institute coaches via News Shots.

I look foreword to your responses and once again, my thanks to Russ for sharing his experiences and allowing me to use them in News Shots.


GUN TRADE ASSOCIATION NEWS

The Gun Trade Association reports that sources close to government report that there will be two bills put before Parliament this autumn. The first will be legislation to implement the ban of lead for shooting. The only details reported to be under discussion are the timescale for the implantation and the exemptions, for example for target shooting. It is believed that the HSE and Defra have put forward a transition period of 18 months from the bill obtaining ascent while the GTA have suggested 5 years will be needed.



The second bill will centre around the licensing of shotguns and firearms and may include the revised costings which are under review between the police and the Home Office. The recent statement reported on page one gives some cheer to those who thought we might be crushed with draconian regulations but the devil will be in the detail. Members may draw their own conclusions when looking at the statement and the consultation documents and questions.
